

The constructed surrealism of **Ruth van Beek**

Ruth van Beek (b. 1977, The Netherlands) makes physical modifications to images drawn from a growing photographic archive to create surrealistic, layered images that, in spite of their constructed composition, feel both organic and uncanny.

The photographic source material is turned into objects by means of cutting, folding, and adding shapes that are often - but not always - made out of painted cardboard. The visibility of these physical interventions plays a crucial role in the image; it is precisely because of their observable construction methods, the shadows cast by the different elements, the loss of natural dimensions and the addition of painted surfaces, that the new images acquire their alienating, theatrical quality. Full of tension between the familiar photographic image and undefinable fantasies.
